

# THE PENTECOST OFFERING HELPS OUR YOUTH BEGIN LIFE WITH A STRONG START—A SOLID FOUNDATION OF FAITH FORMED IN THE FIRST THIRD OF LIFE, FROM CHILDHOOD THROUGH YOUNG ADULTHOOD.

Each year on Pentecost Sunday, we celebrate the gift of the Holy Spirit and the birthday of the church. The Holy Spirit remains with us still, connecting us with *the church of the past*, continuing to inspire *the church of today*, and pointing us to *the church of the future*. Each year, this celebration is marked by receiving the Pentecost Offering which nurtures the faith of those who are the church to come.

Pentecost arrives 50 days after Easter and 10 days after the Ascension — when Jesus ascends into heaven. Jesus and the Scriptures are making an important theological point at Pentecost. Jesus ascends and the church is born. If his mission and ministry is to continue, it is upon us, his disciples, to keep it going, and we have the Holy Spirit to lead us, who blesses us all with different gifts to be used at different times and in different ways. These gifts of the Spirit are bestowed upon us to be used for the "building up of the body of Christ" (Ephesians 4:12). Our gifts to the Pentecost Offering connect with God's hope and future, supporting ministries with children, youth and young adults by building a life of faith.

## **QUICK FACTS**

- Congregations keep 40% of raised funds to initiate or support programs for young people in their communities.
- The first Presbyterian Youth Triennium was held in 1980. Visit presbyterianyouthtriennium.org for more information and new online resources.
- The Day of Pentecost is referred to as the birthday of the Church.
- Pentecost is usually represented with the color red, which symbolizes the fire of the Holy Spirit.

Since the Pentecost Offering started in 1998, Presbyterians have raised more than \$16 million for ministries that benefit younger members of God's family. We believe we are called to do even more — to support and care for young people as they build a strong foundation of faith.

## YOUR GIFTS AT WORK

## Congregational Initiatives with Young People

of the Pentecost Offering remains with your congregation to support ministries with children and youth in your church and local community.

Churches have used these funds to:

- Run an affordable day care for young teen mothers to enable them to complete their education.
- Identify and train local leaders for participation in the "Educate a Child: Transform the World" national initiative.
- Conduct workshops and presentations and develop resources to end child sex and labor trafficking.
- Help promote the National Observance of Children's Sabbaths
- Create web and print resources to address systemic issues that impact children, such as poverty, health, and consumerism.
- Initiate local, afterschool or summer programs for latchkey children.

## Serving Communities (Young Adult Volunteers)

goes to Young Adult Volunteer (YAV) experience. Your gifts to the Offering have helped this ministry area to:

- Train and equip volunteers to engage in mission at 13 sites in the U.S. and around the world.
- Reduce barriers to serve by providing assistance with student loan debt, medical insurance, and a simple living stipend.
- Provide additional funding to ensure all young adults have the opportunity to participate.
- Provide funds for retreats, orientation events, and counseling to help YAVs discern God's call.

## Guiding Youth (Youth Ministries)

supports ministries with youth, ages 12–18, and those called to accompany them. Your gifts to the Offering helped this ministry area to:

- Fund a new endeavor called *The Senior Project*. This project offers a path and plan for graduating seniors to explore their next steps in faith, community, and vocation.

## Child Advocacy

supports the "Educate a Child, Transform the World" national initiative, which was affirmed at the 221st General Assembly (2014). The goal of this initiative is to motivate and inspire Presbyterians to better the lives of children by to joining in God's ongoing transformation of the world by working and advocating to ensure equitable, accessible, quality public education so that all children, created in the image of God, may grow into the fullness of life.

## 2 MAKING A DIFFERENCE

**Inspire your congregation** to give by sharing some of the ways other churches have used their 40% of the Pentecost Offering on behalf of children, youth, and young adults in their communities:

## Assisting the Families of Children at risk

Supporting a child advocacy center where the focus is on the needs of child abuse and neglect victims, as well as their non-offending caregivers, as they go through investigative and legal processes.

Supporting a program that pairs children with disabilities such as autism with children who do not, where strengths are celebrated and differences are accepted.

Creating, promoting, and expanding services for grandparents and other relatives who have taken on the responsibility of surrogate parenting due to the absence of parents.

## Supporting Education for at-risk Youth

Providing vouchers for new school shoes.

Collecting and providing school supplies.

Supporting a collaborative project where multiple agencies with shared goals and values co-locate to provide programming for low income and homeless families and youth at the elementary school.

# Growing Mission Work with Youth and Young Adults

Contributing to the congregation's own children and youth fund.

Supporting college outreach ministries.

Providing scholarships to summer camps.

Supporting the Young Adult Volunteer (YAV) program within the local presbytery.

## Ministering to at-risk Children and Teens

Contributing and volunteering at an affordable day care ministry for teen parents.

Contributing to a school backpack program so low-income children get the nutritious foods they need when school is not in session.

Supporting a program that builds the self-esteem of black, male, teens through education and service.

Providing guidance for teenage girls through a program that teaches health, exercise, nutrition, self-esteem and offers a safe place to discuss issues affecting young girls.

Contributing to a center for children of abused spouses.

Providing a weekly Wednesday night meal free of charge.

Offering funds to an anti-bullying program at the local elementary school.

## Providing for Health and Safety

Preventing youth suicide through awareness, upstream educational programs, and activities that support and empower youth, their families, and the community.

Supporting a program to increase awareness about personal and community issues, prevent and treat substance abuse, and to promote healthy families and a safe community.

Contributing funds to programs that improve the lives of foster children with school supplies, toys, and a suitcase so they don't have to travel from home to home with their belongings in a trash bag.

## PROMOTING PENTECOST: BEFORE THE OFFERING

## **PLAN**

Life is easier when a plan is in place. If you make arrangements ahead of time, promotion will go more smoothly, and you'll make the most of every opportunity to motivate your congregation to share and support the Pentecost Offering.

- Set dates with your session. Congregations commonly receive the Offering on Pentecost Sunday (May 28) or other youth-focused Sundays such as College and Young Adult Sunday (August 6) or Youth in the Church and World (August 13), or during Vacation Bible School.
- Commit to a goal with the session—one higher than the total raised last year—and discuss ideas on how to use your congregation's portion (40%).
- Contact Presbyterian Customer Service 800-533-4371 or customer\_service@presbypub.com to order any additional materials you may need.
- Locate and open the shipment of materials you received. Display the Pentecost poster in a prominent place within your church. Find other tools to help with developing your interpretation plan by reviewing the outline of available resources on page 16.
- Share the Pentecost Curriculum with your Christian education and worship committees. Learn more at pcusa.org/socurriculum
- Ask young people to present Minutes for Mission from the pulpit. Note the bulletins feature unique messages that expand on specific Minutes for Mission (pages 11-15, feel free to pair as you like). Minutes for Mission can also be downloaded at pcusa.org/pentecost
- Ask your pastor about sending a promotional email or letter to each person in your congregation (there is a sample pastor letter online). Be sure to include the link to the Pentecost Offering website (pcusa.org/pentecost), so your members can learn more about the work supported by their gifts.
- Use the Presbyterian Giving Catalog to get people involved and to give examples of how the Mission Agency uses some of its funds. presbyteriangifts.org



## **BE CREATIVE**

Though we've laid out a plan for you, your creativity and voice is an important part of this process. We'll never know your congregation the way you do. What kind of activities do they love?

- Ask for suggestions from the youth and young adults in your congregation about how to use the 40% kept by your congregation.
- Think about how you can integrate the worship resources into your service holistically rather than treating them as add-ons. Doing this emphasizes the role our witness in the world plays in our own discipleship.
- Create a plan for involving children and youth in promoting the Offering through
  a skit or other worship activity. One option is having your youth choose one of
  the Pentecost-supported gifts from the Presbyterian Giving Catalog to sponsor,
  and present it to the congregation along with how they think their gift will make a
  difference for others.

## PROMOTING PENTECOST: DURING THE OFFERING

## **PLAN**

- Hang the Offering poster in a prominent location, if you have not already created a display.
- Place a folded insert in the Sunday bulletin every week. There are two inserts —
   Building up the body of Christ and We are There this year. Feel free to use the same
   bulletin for multiple weeks if you are promoting all month.
- Put Offering envelopes in pew racks every week.
- **Present Minutes for Mission**, and encourage your members to give generously, with reminders of the goal you set with the session.
- Use the worship resources found on our website, including a set of customizable PowerPoint slides, and focus on the Offering in a sermon.
- **Involve children and youth**—ask them to hand out bulletin inserts as an alternative to placing them in pews.
- Promote the Offering on your church's Facebook page with the Pentecost cover photo.
- Use the provided art, graphics, and content in your church newsletter, blog, or website.
- Send a letter to your congregation from the pastor (a customizable letter can be found online). This provides members who might have missed the Offering collection a chance to support the ministry. Be sure to include the link to the Pentecost Offering website (pcusa.org/pentecost), so members can learn more about the work supported by their gifts.
- Ask your pastor about sending a reminder email or letter to each person in your congregation, encouraging generous support. (Surveys show this makes a significant difference in congregant giving.)
- Create a display in the narthex. Visit pcusa.org/pentecost-display



## **5** PROMOTING PENTECOST: AFTER THE OFFERING

- Thank your congregation for their generous gifts and share the total raised.
- Celebrate meeting or exceeding your original goal! Remind them of the causes they have supported: ministries with youth, young adult volunteers, and advocacy and education for children at risk.
- **Keep 40%** of the Offering for your congregation's use on behalf of local, youth-focused ministries and programs. See page 5 for ideas, and share how the retained portion will be used.
- Send in the remaining 60% as your congregation's offering. At the direction of the 220th General Assembly (2012), congregations are encouraged to remit Pentecost gifts directly to the Presbyterian Mission Agency, with "Pentecost Offering" on the memo line.

#### **HOW DID THEY DO THAT?**

How many times have we seen a modern building, an historic landmark, a great cathedral or a monument and thought, "How did they do that?" Regardless of when it was built, the skill and craftsmanship needed to not only imagine it, but to make it sturdy enough to safely and securely withstand the test of time, boggles the mind.

But what of people? We watch, listen and read as sports legends, great orators, talented musicians of every style of performance and brilliant writers astound us with their skills. #### PENTECOST OFFERING CONNECTS YOUTH IN THE BODY OF CHRIST

Fifteen-year-old Grace Reck usually can't wait to try new things, but when given the chance last year to attend her first churchwide youth conference at Montreat, she dragged her feet — for a minute.

"For both Grace and her twin sister, Emma, the Montreat Youth Conference was a pivotal experience in their faith journey," said the Rev. Tara N. Reck, pastor of Anchorage Presbyterian Church in Anchorage, Kentucky.

That's why a 2022 tri-presbytery event held by the presbyteries of Mid-Kentucky, Transylvania and Western Kentucky called "Belonging Together" attracted Grace and brought together a diverse group of sixth to 12th graders across the Commonwealth of Kentucky. The presbyteries' collective vision was to gather Kentucky Presbyterians annually for fellowship, learning and worship, with pastors/elders and youth meeting to build relationships.

"All our events build up the body of Christ in our worship, keynote, small groups and table fellowship," said Leslee Kirkconnell, a certified educator and ruling elder in the Presbytery of Western Kentucky. "This event with its theme of 'Belonging Together' emphasized the very real bonds we have as humans, as Christians, as Presbyterians. We learned these bonds must be nurtured and encouraged — that relationships are so important."

Creating opportunities for youth to grow, thrive and take part in building up the body of Christ is what the Pentecost Offering — one of the PC(USA)'s four Special Offerings — is all about. Not only do gifts to the Pentecost Offering support the Office of Presbyterian Youth and Triennium, but the offering also helps to fund the Young Adult Volunteer Program and the Educate a Child, Transform the World national initiative.

Forty percent of the Pentecost Offering is retained by congregations just like ours for local ministries in our communities, while the remaining 60% is used to support children at risk, and youth and young adults through ministries of the Mission Agency. In past years, we have used our 40% of our offering to (PLEASE DESCRIBE YOUR MINISTRY).

Gina Yeager-Buckley, associate for the Presbyterian Youth and Triennium office, said, "The Pentecost Offering enables young people to be included in some beautiful formation adventures that allow them to shine as well as helps them lead us as a church. It also is a way for us to fulfill our baptismal vows because this offering directly funds those who are developing and forming their faith in Jesus Christ."

#### PENTECOST OFFERING SETS AT-RISK YOUTH ON THE ROAD TO SUCCESS

Everywhere he looked, the Rev. Allen Shelton saw tremendous gaps — gaps keeping high school-aged young people of color from succeeding in life.

Allen, a veteran educator, community advocate and pastor in New Jersey, was determined not to watch promising youth fall through the cracks of an increasingly broken educational system. He wanted to ensure the future success of primarily urban, adolescent young people, so in 2010 he founded Good Success Academies.

Good Success Academies has become a tremendously successful program, outgrowing the church and expanding beyond its original goal of serving Montclair-area youth. In the 12 years since its founding, the once-local initiative — in partnership with Montclair State University and Rutgers University — now impacts youth in surrounding communities, readying them for college, work and the world.

Tariq Mayo, for one, is grateful for his Good Success experience.

"I got into Good Success because our high school principal was handing out flyers," he recalled. "It helped me to get a job. Previously I didn't know what to wear or what to say at an interview. Good Success helped me figure it out, including what type of suits to wear."

Tariq also credits Good Success with helping him to write the application essays that earned him acceptance into Montclair State University, where he is now studying computer science.

Helping youth achieve their God-given potential is what the Pentecost Offering — one of the PC(USA)'s four Special Offerings — is all about. Not only do gifts to the Pentecost Offering benefit at-risk children and youth through the "Educate a Child, Transform the World" national initiative, but the Offering also encourages, develops and supports the church's young

people through the Young Adult Volunteer program and the Presbyterian Youth Triennium.

Forty percent of the Pentecost Offering is retained by individual congregations just like ours for local ministries that support young people, while the remaining 60% is used to support children at risk, youth and young adults through ministries of the Presbyterian Mission Agency. Here at (CHURCH) we use our portion of the Offering to (PLEASE DESCRIBE).

"If someone wanted to know why they should give to the Pentecost Offering," says Tariq, "I would explain that programs like Good Success Academies allow young people to get a better understanding of how to get a job and how to be a leader."

#### PENTECOST OFFERING HELPS YOUNG PEOPLE CHALLENGE THE WORLD'S INJUSTICES

Yuriko Beltran wants to change the world — which is exactly why the 23-year-old entered the PC(USA)'s Young Adult Volunteer (YAV) program.

"I like the fact that I actively contribute to change, which is what the YAV program mainly seeks to accomplish," she said.

The YAV program is an ecumenical, faith-based year of service in sites across the U.S. and around the world that has been changing the lives of young people ages 19–30 for nearly three decades. The YAV experience emphasizes living in intentional Christian community, spiritual formation and vocational discernment. Yuriko is currently serving at the Peru YAV site, managed by mission co-worker and site coordinator Jenny Valles.

"This is a program where young people can experience dramatic transformation in their lives through their experiences serving alongside our global partners," said Jenny. "To be able to accompany the young adults in a personal way through these experiences is such a privilege and makes this ministry both fun and meaningful."

Jenny shares, "The focus of the YAV program in Peru has always been addressing systemic poverty and racism. Many of our partners have been working on these issues for years at the local, national and international levels. Our volunteers have an orientation and retreats to further address these issues along with others specific to the context of Peru such as rights and challenges of the LGBTQ+ community, Machismo in Peru, political context and economy of Peru, climate change, personal self-care and intercultural challenges."

Yuriko states, "I believe that being able to hear firsthand the testimonies of people who face a certain problem, and the goals they set to generate positive changes, makes me identify and empathize with people and their needs," said Yuriko. "This motivates me."

Gifts to the Pentecost Offering support the YAV program, and also the Office of Presbyterian Youth and Triennium and the "Educate a Child, Transform the World" national initiative. Forty percent of the Offering is retained by congregations just like ours for our own ministries like (DESCRIBE HOW YOU USE, OR WILL USE, YOUR 40%). The remaining 60% is used at the Presbyterian Mission Agency level.

#### **WE ARE ALL BUILDERS**

You may never have thought of yourself as a builder, but you are — we all are. Some people you know actually do build solid things like houses and bridges or maybe roads and highways. But we all build things that support our future.

Perhaps you build a garden each spring or a menu plan for the week. At work, maybe you build a project plan that helps your team get to their goal or a budget that sustains not just your work, but the employment that many count on. We build relationships with our neighbors and friendships that may last a lifetime. Teachers are tremendous builders; among the best of all.

Take a look around you ... everyone you see is a builder of some sort. And let's not forget we stand on the shoulders of those who built this church — and I am not just talking about the walls or the pews. I am talking about building the commitment, relationships, sustainability, and constant affirmation of the faith and the purpose that we share.

Look around you ... we are all builders.

Building a foundation of faith in the young people who will sustain the future of the church is an important part of our ministry — our shared opportunity. Remember Whitney Houston's song that contained the lyrics "I believe the children are our future, teach them well and let them lead the way"? That song could actually be the theme for what I am here to ask you to really think about — the reason that we receive the Pentecost Offering.

The Pentecost Offering, one of four Special Offerings of the PC(USA), builds up the body of Christ by investing in children from their earliest years to young adulthood. The Offering supports formative and inspiring opportunities for youth here in our nation and in communities around the world. Young people like Gina, Yuriko and Tariq, who have had their lives

changed by Presbyterian Mission-funded programs, including the "Educate a Child, Transform the World" national initiative, our Presbyterian Youth Triennium and other camps and gatherings, and the Young Adult Volunteer Program. 






Building up the body of Christ poster

The three foci in Matthew 25 calls us as a church to eradicate systemic poverty, dismantle systemic racism and promote congregational vitality. Public education is one of the many critical issues that embody the intersectional concerns of poverty and social inequity. These resources are designed to assist Presbyterians who seek to be engaged in this important work.

The Educate a Child Toolkit provides practical tools and starting points for congregations working or seeking involvement with direct service and advocacy for education. Want to start an education-oriented ministry in your congregation but don't know where to begin? Already have an education program but want to be more effective? Involved in direct service but looking for a way to participate in local education advocacy? Have great ideas for a ministry but looking for funding sources?






